I also thank the club's major sponsors:



1B CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The season began with the traditional opener against Perth Postals, with the traditional narrow win to the opposition. Recruit Brad O'Brien showed promise with 3/21 off 19 overs.

The next game was a one sided victory over Como followed by a fighting win against Cowan University with Andrew Billington bowling superbly to return 7/29 off 21 overs.

The fourth game saw an inexplicable loss to the unfancied Stirling chiefly attributable to poor fielding: an indicator of things to come.

With 2 wins out of 4 games the basic composition of the side was altered at the selection table with Alan Bland, Tom Nye, Craig Dewar and John McKechnie being brought into the side.

The changes reaped success with victories in 4 of the next 5 games to leave the side well placed at the Christmas break. John McNamara, Peter Rocca, Keith Kriebich and Tom Nye were all in the runs with the highlight being an unbeaten century to John McNamara against Ashfield.

Craig Dewar and Andrew Billington headed a powerful bowling attack and the side were able to mask their deficiencies in the field with strong performances with bat and ball.

The second half of the season the side loss the playing services of Schofield and Brad O'Brien, arguably two of teams most talented players. This resulted in Gary Powell forcing his way into the side.

Perth Postals reinforced their superiority with another close win against us but the side was beginning to click as a unit.

The return game against Como was marred by rain which cost the side an almost certain outright but the long hours spent in the pavilion watching the rain fall brought the players closer together and moulded them into a unit to be reckoned with.

Up and coming player of the future, Mark Roberts, joined the side and enjoyed immediate success with bat and ball against Stirling. In the same game, Alan Bland returned the outstanding figures of 5/19 off 19 overs and Hayward Lewis in a cameo performance late

in the afternoon slaughtered the Stirling attack to score 62 out the first 74 runs.

Despite a 9/4 win/loss record the side entered the final game needing to win against Maylands to ensure its spot in the finals. Things looked grim at 6/51 but a fighting partnership between Gary Powell and Peter Rocca gave us 158 off 40 overs and in with a chance.

Maylands looked well placed at 3/101 but "Legend" Verity decided the time was right to make his contribution and took three quick wickets. John McKechnie chipped in to clean up the tail with 4/9 and we were in the finals.

The first semi final against Windsor was dominated by unbeaten 91 to John McNamara who steered the side to victory contributing 53 of the last 75 runs after the side was in trouble at 5/120 chasing 187.

Gary Powell and Andrew Billington also made useful contributions with the bat.

Mark Roberts bowled well in the game to take 3/42 but unfortunately his season came to a premature end due to misadventure on the Saturday night of the game.

The preliminary final against arch rival Perth Postals produced another absorbing contest with Postals been restricted to 183, chiefly due to Alan Bland 4/38 and Andrew Billington 3/65.

The side start well with an opening stand of 31 but were soon in trouble when 3 wickets fell for the addition of only 1 run. Gary Powell again showed his worth with a fine 49 and Hayward Lewis finished the opposition off with a quick fire 45.

We were in the Grand Final with the only change being the return of Craig Dewar after his eye operation.

Point Heathcote batted first and were in all sorts of trouble at 2/0 and a further chance missed. We continued to bowl, not if field, well and had them 3/31, 4/37, 5/62 and 6/89. At this stage we looked well placed with some of the competitions best batsmen sitting back in the pavilion.

To their credit Point Heathcote fought back to post 195. Dropped chances proved costly and given the great start we should have done better. Once again Andrew Billington was outstanding with 6/80 off 27 overs.

The target was always going to be difficult and the batsmen failed to meet the challenge and we were bundled out for 97.

The season must be seen as a success and poor fielding prevented the side from dominating the competition. Andrew Billington realised the potential he had shown in previous years to become the grades premier bowler.

The other bowlers consisting of Alan Bland , John McKechnie and Craig Dewar ably assisted Andrew Billington.

Once again John McNamara, Peter Rocca, Keith Kriebich and Tom Nye led the batting with Gary Powell and Hayward Lewis making timely contributions when it counted. Mark Robert showed enough to indicate that he is a player of the future.

The side deserved to play in the Grand Final and certainly had its chances to win. However given the ageing nature of the team it was difficult to see Scarborough becoming a force in 1A in the long term. Perhaps the loss affords us the opportunity to reinvigorate the team with some of the up and coming players who could provide the club with a competitive 1A in years to come.

On a final note, does any one remember the name of the big bloke with the perm who played every game, made 90 runs, took 8 wickets for the season and thought he was running the show?

The side qualified for their second successive finals campaign after a "must win situation" in the last qualifying game.

The fist semi- final saw the side meet Windsor at De Lacy Reserve.

Batting first, Windsor scored 8/187 from their allotted 75 overs, thanks largely to a sixth wicket partnership of 89 runs between Greg Connaughton(54) and David Christian(59 not out).

The bowling honours were evenly shared amongst the bowlers. Mark Roberts returned the good figures of 3/42, with good support from Alan Bland 2/26 and Andrew Billington 1/36 from 23 overs.

Requiring 188 runs for victory, Scarborough's cause was dealt a severe blow with an overnight accident to Mark Roberts leaving the side with only ten fit players.

Scarborough captain Graham Verity's decision to send the opposition in paid instant dividends as Andrew Billington gave the side a dream start with 2/0 in the first over.

Heathcote staged a mini recovery to reach 6/89, before the dogged lan Melrose found a welling ally in Steve Hancock. The pair's sixth wicket stand of 64 brought the match back to level terms, with Heathcote finally totalling 195.

Melrose's face saving innings of 94 included 10 fours and 1 six and he was unlucky not to reach a century.

Billington turned in yet another lionhearted performance with the ball, taking 6 wickets for 80 from 27 overs. Sid Bland lent valuable support with 2/21.

Hopes of a Scarborough victory were soon dashed on day two with the loss of in-form openers Peter Rocca and John McNamara with only 20 runs on the board.

Things became progressively worse as 2/39 became 4/40 and 4/67 became 97 all out. Only Keith Kreibich (18) and "Choco" Powell (17) batted longer than 40 minutes on day two, a day that saw ten Scarborough wickets fall in just 36 overs.

2B CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The side did a great job during the season to enable us to play off in the grand final for the second year running.

A convincing victory in the second semi-final over Perth Postals gave the side a sense of confidence of winning the permiership this season. However, a fortnight later Postals were able to reverse the result in the grand final.

There were a number of team and individual highlights during the season that are worth reflecting on.

In the game against Como, David Stoate embarked on another run feast to score a magnificent 150 not out.

The end of the season saw David Stoate head the aggregates with 505 runs at 50.50 and Steve Lockwood top the grade averages with 207 runs at 69.00.

Another consistent performer for the season was Stan Strack who scored 213 runs at 21.30 which included a career best score of 86 not out against Como. Stan also excelled in the field to hold 18 catches for the season.

The later stage of the season saw Allan "BAZZA" Barron rejoin the club after work commitments in the country. "Bazza" had an immediate impact with the bat to score 189 runs at 63.00 from just four innings.

"Bazza" will no doubt earn higher honours in the 1992/93 season.

Yours truly headed the grade bowling aggregates with 40 wickets at 12.18 to go past 450 career wickets.

Young up and coming bowler Ken Collier demonstrated considerable promise in taking 18 wickets after being promoted from the third side. Ken's efforts in the finals were especially encouraging.

An all round performance was provided by Rob "Scoobie" Cunningham during the season that resulted in him scoring 192 runs at 27.43 and taking 20 wickets. A great all rounder!

My "Captain's Choice" award this season went to Shane "Angry" Kensitt for his determined innings he played throughout the season and his dedicated approach to training was a fine example for his team mates.

Given the depth within the club, the 1992/93 season promises to be a prosperous one for the second side and the rest of the club.

THIRD SIDE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The 1991/92 season was a year of re-building for the third side. Although we finished in sixth position on the premiership ladder, our record of six wins, six losses and two draws indicates to some extent the level of competitiveness that we were able to achieve.

Indeed, had things gone our way, we could have won as many as nine matches. In a season where good fortune appeared to favour the opposition, we lost one match by one wicket, another by 4 runs and another match with three balls remaining.

After a slow start, when we won just one of our first four matches, we hit our straps in round 5, and were competitive in every match from then on.

Selection policy meant that only players who had trained during the week of selection, except for the wicket-keeper, could be considered. Consequently we never had a truly representative third side at any time during the season. It was no co-incidence that our form improved when this policy was lacksed, to some degree, late in the year.

The one-day matches proved to be our undoing, as we won only two of seven encounters. However, in two-day matches we had the best record of all sides in the grade. In fact the only two-dayer that we lost was when Bayswater's last pair combined to add 36 runs to steal the match from us.

The side's most successful batsman over the course of the year was experienced campaigner, Rob Storey. Rob was used primarily in the role of No. 4 batsman, and it was from this position that his best performances came. He tallied 233 runs during the season to win both the run aggregate and average awards. A highlight of the summer was his brilliant innings of 95 against Manning - an innings most deserving of a century. Rob also notched a well compiled half-century against Belmont.

Rob received support in the batting department from the vastly improved No. 3 - Bruce Lawson, Allan Barron, first-year player Matt Davis, Rory Whitelaw and opener Peter Tonkin. Generally our batsmen showed plenty of grit and fighting spirit and this was no more evident than in round 13 against runners-up Maylands, when our tail-enders Doug Smith, Alberto Puado and Fred Chatfield rescued us from a disasterous 7-63 to a total of 181 all out. Against an attack that included a 1A grade opening bowler our last three wickets defied everything Maylands could throw at them for three-and-a-half-hours. Inspired by this, first-gamer Wayne Aldersea promptly blasted a 69 minute unbeaten century in the second innings of the same match. No summary of our batting would be complete without reference to David "Rambo" Romano. He was by far our most consistent batsman.

The bowling honours were shared by left-armer Fred Chatfield and swing-bowler Matt Davis, with 17 wickets apiece. Matt also collected the award for the best bowling average. Other bowlers to perform with distinction included Ken Collier, who thrived in the role of strike-bowler early in the season. With 12 scalps in just four matches Ken deservedly earned higher honours before the new year, where he continued to reap havoc. Veteran Gerard Wood, medium-pacer Peter "Deadly" Tonkin, Alberto Puado and Peter Pollard all impressed with the ball at various times of the year.

All-rounder Mick Billington was a worthy winner of the captain's trophy award. Although shuffled up and down the batting list, "Billy" still managed to finish fifth in the sides' runaggregates. He, like Rob "Nadia" Storey also proved a useful change bowler and reliable fielder, particularly in the outfield. So successful was "Nadia" as a partnership-breaker, that he took a wicket in every innings that he bowled.

Looking ahead to next season I would hope that the Committee gives serious consideration to nominating our third side for the 2B grade and our second side for the 3A grade. In my opinion there is no question that the 3A grade is of a superior standard to that of the 2B grade. Players who have the ability to graduate through to the top-side next season from the thirds include Mark Roberts, Ken Collier, Matt Davis and Peter Tonkin.

Finally I would like to thank the players of the team for their support in what was a tough season - particularly the players who played most of the season in the thirds. It was pleasing that these guys continued to give their all in a side which lacked natural talent, even after it had become apparent that we could not reach the finals. It was frustrating to lose a number of close matches with a side that contained two or three fifth side players while at the same time the fourth side was able to choose a far superior combination of players. Hopefully this situation will not arise again in 1992/93.

Congratulations to "Delly" and the fourths on their historic victory on 29 March 1992 and well done to "Legend" and "P.J." on reaching their respective grand finals. These efforts go along way towards creating traditions and establishing loyalties within our club.


Lee "Ernie" Collison's consistency is underlined by the fact he never once reached 50.

Grand final drama started well and truly before Saturday when Scarborough "run machine" Lee Collison had his left arm broken by a Graeme Smart thunderbolt in the dying minutes of Thursday night training. This incident dispelled any doubts as to whether Mark Berich would force his way into the eleven, ironically himself suffering a frustrating battle with injury.

As it was, this was the only change to the team that had accounted for Rivervale the previous week.

Saturday, 28 March 1992, saw Scarborough meet arch rivals Morley at Ascot Park; the same venue where Scarborough's 2B side had suffered a devastating Grand Final loss twelve months earlier.

A fierce rivalry had built up between the teams during the season. Comments of Morley's motor mouth and star batsman Doug Abbot that he intended to finish his career with a Premiership only served to fuel the fire between the clubs. Going into the match the sides had met on four occasions during the season, with Morley winning twice and Scarborough once, with one match drawn.

On a fine relatively still day, Scarborough Captain Gordon Dell won the toss and elected to bat despite having to reshuffle his batting order to compensate for the loss of Collison. Dell figured that the "runs on the board" policy was the best policy for a Grand Final.

Whereas the Scarborough side contained just the one change from the previous week, Morley made four changes to their successful 2nd Semi-Final line-up. Kitchen, Sassanelli, Smith and Barrows made way for Mark Fiaschi, Paul Marinovich, Laffrey and Russocaronte.

Chris Gray, having scored a match winning 80 not out in round six against Morley as an opener, was given the job of partnering Geoff "Wal" Wheeler to the crease.

Morley Captain Matt O'Mara handed the new ball to medium fast bowlers Paul "Dick" Mac and Jason Williams, who between them had claimed seven Scarborough scalps in their last outing.

Mac, a key player in the Morley camp, had caused something of a scare among his team mates by arriving just minutes prior to the start of play. "Dick", who was under suspension from driving, had been waiting for a lift to the ground that never eventuated. Fortunately for Morley, "Dick" decided to push his luck and drove himself to the ground, using his "work licence".

Mac began from the pavilion end to Wheeler with a maiden, while Gray scored the first run of the Grand Final in the following over from Williams.

It did not take long for Mac to strike, his "all arms and legs" bowling claiming Wheeler as he cut firmly to gully where he was brilliantly caught by Marinovich. At 1/8 in the fifth over, Paul Collier joined Gray and the pair quietly took the score to 27 when Williams was replaced by medium pacer Laffrey from the southern end.

With his third delivery, Laffrey penetrated the seemingly solid defence of Gray to send him on his way, after he had looked set for a big score. Steve Coyle joined Collier and the pair took the score to 2/37 by drinks.

After the break, the rot set in as Collier (11), Coyle (13), Smart (1) and Gerard Wood (4) all fell as the total reached a shaky 6/74. Coyle's dismissal LBW to the gentle swing of Jamie Windus seemed somewhat astonishing. Coyle appeared to be struck high on the thigh pad, with the ball clearly missing leg stump.

By this time Peter Pollard was well set on 18. He found a stubborn partner in Berich. The pairs seventh wicket stand of 46 runs being priceless to the team's cause. Pollard went on to a magnificent 50. An outstanding contribution given the circumstances. "Rooster's" innings included 32 scoring shots many from full blooded on-drives that registered only one's or two's on the painfully slow outfield.

Berich defiantly battled on to 15, with Dell, Vince Del Prete and Mark Senior all contributing in the later stages of the innings. Morley had now been set a victory target of 145 - no easy feat on such a large, slow ground.

The Morley bowlers shared the wickets in an innings that lasted 74.3 overs.

Day two saw Morley opener Abbot immediately make his intentions clear. He unleashed a series of attacking strokes as the "Dougie Show" took centre stage, and the score raced to 35. He was particularly severe on Wood - but Wood soon had revenge when he deceived him with a superb delivery to send Abbot's stumps crashing. Morley 1/35 from just ten overs.

An aggressive Smart quickly disposed of No. 3 Russocaronte (3), caught by Pollard before capturing the crucial wicket of young opener Fiaschi LBW for 21, to leave Morley at 3/61.

When Senior caught Marinovich off Wood at forward square leg, Morley had slumped to 4/67 to give Scarborough a sniff of victory.

A key factor at this stage of the match was the run rate. After a flying start, the Morley run rate had slowed to a trickle against a tight Scarborough attack and incredibly, no boundaries had yet been struck in the match.

Senior, growing in stature as a bowler week by week, was introduced into the attack from the southern end and he did not let his captain down - his first five overs costing just three runs.

With the tea break inminent and Morley still in control at 4/83, three telling blows were struck by Scarborough.

Firstly, Gray captured the prized wicket of Morley's 2nd Semi-Final hero Mark Podmore, caught behind by Del Prete, for one.

A frustrated Windus, then tried to hit Senior out of the ground and succeeded only in skying him towards cover where Senior held onto a well judged caught and bowled. Windus out for a duck; Morley 6/88.

However, the real turning point in the match came when left-hander Warren Husking, looking comfortable on 28, attempted a second run on the arm of Senior fielding at deep square leg, only to be convincingly run out by the keeper Del Prete.

Tea was taken with Morley 7/101 and O'Mara and Williams at the crease. It was around this time that the victorions 3A Morley side arrived, and their chants of "C'mon Morley" only seemed to put more pressure on their team mates, while making Scarborough even more determined.

Immediately after the resumption of play, O'Mara decided to take the bowling by the scruff of the neck, but he went caught and bowled by a fiery Smart from an attempted pull - Morley 8/102 with only 15 overs remaining.

The topsy turvey match continued to fluctuate as the ninth wicket pair of Williams and Mac put together a determined and worrying partnership of 23 before "the grossly underbowled" Gray struck with his first ball of a new spell, having replaced Wood from the pavilion end.

At 9/125, Morley needed 19 runs to win from 29 balls. With an umbrella field set, the batsmen were tempted to hit over the top of the in-field, in order to score the necessary runs. This proved their undoing as last man Laffrey's cross batted slash was well caught by Collier low down to his right at mid-off from the bowling of Smart. This gave Scarborough a 16 run victory, and their first flag as an amalgamated club.

Smart took the bowling honours with 4/41 from 25.5 hostile overs, while Gray (2/26), Wood (2/48) and Senior (1/8) from nine overs) all played vital roles.

As "Rooster" so aptly put it as the Premiers left the field "How does it feel now Dougie?"


